*A recommended volume of the laid out article is 5-6 pages prepared according to the requirements of the laid out format.*

Introduction presents the scientific problem of the article, its novelty, exploration of the problem, aim, objective, research methods).

The text of an article should be arranged in two columns (width: 8,4 cm – spacing: 0,6 cm.) 10 pt.

The text is written in English with 1 interval spacing. Each paragraph should be started on a new line (0.6 cm).

The text revealing who has already dealt with the problem being researched in Lithuania and foreign countries and give the surname and the year of presentation e.g. (Ciarniene, 2008), (Ciarniene, 2010; Paulaviciene, 2010) or (Ciarniene & Paulaviciene, 2010; Snieska *et al.*, 2010). The authors Name and Surname please used Latin letters only.

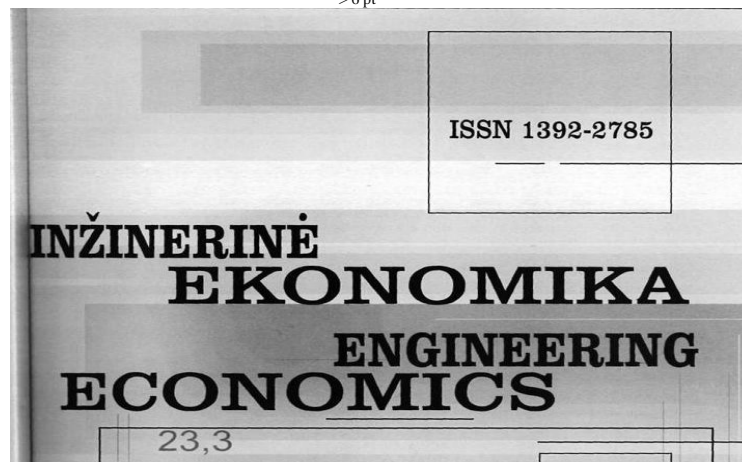

Here are some basic reference forms (*journal article; book; book chapter, the Internet address*), each publications should be started on a new line (0,75 cm), the spacing between research publications is 3 mm, the text is written with an interval spacing, e. g.:
